Information for candidates

What is the Occupational English Test (OET)?

OET is a healthcare-specific English language test. It assesses the language proficiency of healthcare professionals looking to register and practise in an English-speaking environment.

Is OET the right test for me?

OET tests international health practitioners from the following 12 professions:

Dentistry	Occupational Therapy	Podiatry
Dietetics	Optometry	Radiography
Medicine	Pharmacy	Speech Pathology
Nursing	Physiotherapy	Veterinary Science

If you have chosen one of these professions, OET is the ideal test for you. It is a significant milestone towards your international career development.

OET is a practical test with content that reflects real-life tasks performed in the healthcare sector. Taking the test has enabled me to gain a deeper insight into the communication skills required for my occupation.

Why should I take OET?

 OET is the English language test designed specifically for healthcare professionals.

OET is recognised as proof of English proficiency by health regulators in the UK, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, Dubai, Namibia and Singapore for registration.

OET is also accepted by the Australian Department of Immigration and Immigration New Zealand for all visa categories where an English language test result may be required, including Skilled Migrant Category.

- OET helps develop language skills for success in healthcare courses, clinical placement, healthcare registration and the workplace.
- It's easy to prepare for the test using OET's preparation resources, many of which are online and included in the cost of the test.

When and how will I receive my results?

Your results will be released approximately 16 business days after the test: log in to your secure online profile to see them.

How is OET scored?

You will receive a separate grade for each sub-test ranging from A (highest) to E (lowest). There is no overall grade.

Here are the descriptions for each grade that appear on the Statement of Results:

OET grade	Description of ability	IELTS equivalence
А	Very high level of performance	8.0 - 9.0
В	High level of performance; i.e. able to use English with fluency and accuracy adequate for healthcare registration ¹ , appropriate visa categories, healthcare courses and workplaces	7.0 – 7.5
C+	Very good level of performance; adequate for appropriate visa categories, healthcare courses and workplaces	6.5
С	Good level of performance; adequate for appropriate visa categories, some healthcare courses and some workplaces	5.5 – 6.0
D	Moderate level of performance: requires improvement	4.0 - 5.0
E	Low level of performance: requires considerable improvement

Who recognises OET?

Government departments

OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency for visas in:

Australia | The Australian Department of Immigration and Border Protection (DIBP) accepts OET for all visa categories where an English test may be required. Visit www.immi.gov.au for more details.

New Zealand | Immigration New Zealand accepts OET for all visa categories where an English test may be required. Visit www.immigration.govt.nz for more details.

Healthcare Boards and Councils

OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency for registration, accreditation and licensing purposes in:

Australia | OET is accepted for registration purposes by most professional Boards within the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA), and most healthcare profession Councils for accreditation purposes.

Dubai Healthcare City Authority-Regulatory (DHCR) OET is accepted for licensing of healthcare professionals who have not graduated from a program offered in English, nor worked or licensed in a native English speaking country.

Ireland | OET is accepted by the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Ireland and the Irish Medical Council.

Namibia | OET is accepted by the Health Professions Council of Namibia.

New Zealand | OET is accepted by most healthcare Boards and Councils in New Zealand.

Singapore | OET is accepted by four major healthcare Councils in Singapore.

UK | OET is accepted by the Nursing and Midwifery Council and the General Medical Council.

Qualification Authorities

Dubai | The Dubai Knowledge and Human Development Authority (KHDA) accepts OET as a quality standard qualification for proof of English proficiency.

New Zealand | The New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) accepts OET as an approved English Proficiency Assessment.

Universities, education providers and recruiters

OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency for employment by healthcare employers, and a growing number of leading educators in:


Australia | OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency for admission and graduation from healthcare courses at leading universities, TAFEs and colleges in Australia.

New Zealand | OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency for admission and graduation from healthcare courses at leading universities and technical colleges.

How is OET different to general or academic English tests?

OET tests real communication scenarios candidates will experience in the healthcare workplace, whereas other tests assess English language skills using everyday scenarios.

What's in the test?

OET covers all four language skills with an emphasis on communication in a healthcare environment. It consists of four sub-tests:

- Listening
- Reading
- Writing
- Speaking.

The Listening and Reading sub-tests are designed to assess your ability to understand spoken and written English, based on health-related topics and tasks common to all professions.

The Writing and Speaking sub-tests are specific to the 12 individual healthcare professions – designed to reflect common tasks performed in the workplace.



The four components of OET

Listening sub-test (approximately 50 minutes)

The Listening sub-test consists of two parts, with 20–28 questions in total:

- **Part A**: a recorded, simulated professional/patient consultation with note-taking questions.
- **Part B**: a recorded talk or lecture on a health-related topic with a range of questions including short answer and multiple choice.

The content for this sub-test is the same for all candidates – irrespective of profession.

Reading sub-test (60 minutes)

The Reading sub-test consists of two parts:

• Part A: summary task

Skim and scan three to four short texts (a total of 650 words) on a single health-related topic and complete a summary paragraph by filling in the missing words (a total of 25–35 gaps), in 15 minutes.

Part A is designed to test your ability to accurately process and retrieve written information in a meaningful way, within a time limit.

 Part B: reading comprehension task Read two passages (600–800 words each) on general health topics and answer 8–10 multiple-choice questions for each text, in 45 minutes.

Part B is designed to assess your ability to read and understand information on health-related topics within a time limit.

The content for this sub-test is the same for all candidates – irrespective of profession.

Writing sub-test (45 minutes)

You will be asked to write a letter – usually a referral letter, based on case notes. In this letter you should:

- record treatment offered to date
- explain the relevant issues to be addressed (based on given instructions)
- show that you have considered the facts and information
- write 180–200 words, set out in an appropriate format.

The content for this sub-test is profession specific.

Speaking sub-test (approximately 20 minutes)

This assesses your ability to communicate effectively in English. It consists of two simulated consultations between a healthcare professional and a patient. In these role-plays you will take the role of the practitioner and the interviewer plays the patient or patient's relative/carer (or for veterinary science, the animal's owner/carer).

The content for this sub-test is profession specific.
